7 - 10 or more assorted coordinating batiks – lights, medium and darks

34 yard - Backing and Facing fabric

# **Batting:**

One piece 24" x 15"

## Yarn

5 – 7 colors of yarn, any weight or size.

#### **Thread**

Any favorite piecing thread

Any favorite quilting thread in coordinating colors

Madiera Super Twist #30 for Couching – coordinating colors (optional) In my opinion, this totally makes the quilt sing! I will have some for sale at "In Person" workshops.

Aurifil – Nylon Invisible Thread for bobbin (optional)

## **Sewing Machine and Attachments:**

Sewing Machine in good working order

Walking Foot

Free Motion Quilting Foot

Couching Foot – Sometimes they are called Braiding Foot or Cording Foot

I use Bernina #21 but you may use any zig-zag foot

#### Tools:

Rotary Cutter & extra blades, Cutting Mat (we will be cutting freezer paper with rotary blade)
Compass or circle templates to cut out organza
Dritz - Fray Check
Scissors & thread snips
Pencil – light and dark for marking fabric
Freezer Paper – 24" x 15"
Black Sharpie Marker
Small Iron and ironing surface
Starbucks Straw
Masking Tape
Spool Holder

See the Layered Strata Landscape Pattern PDF and print it out. This will be your pattern for cutting out the sky, striped batiks, and pieced batiks. The vertical lines in the pieced section are not meant to be followed exactly. They are simply there to show that the section is a pieced section. The circles do not need to be cut out exactly. They are there simply for reference.

You will tape together the four pieces of paper for your pattern, trimming the margins on one side so that the dotted lines are flush. Bring this taped pattern to class.
